

Call time is when each musician must be tuned, seated and ready to rehearse. Arrive 10-15 minutes prior to the call time to allow sufficient time to unpack and tune. Musicians must be in concert dress during the pre-concert rehearsals.

Musicians & Families: Always read e-mail alerts and reminders confirming or changing call times for specific venues on certain dates, as well as for concert attire requirements and protocol, music, music folders and other information.

Lindan Burns, violin soloist 2017 Concerto Competition Winner



Lindan Burns, Concertmaster of the Youth Symphony, has participated in the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon (YSSO) since 2009-2010. Lindan shared that when she joined the YSSO at the age of nine, she was intimidated by the "big kids" but the lush sound of the *Youth Symphony* helped

her overcome her trepidation. As a homeschooled student from grades six through nine, involvement in the YSSO offered her opportunities to work with a conductor and play with accomplished young musicians. A lover of chamber music, Lindan has enjoyed playing in the Chamber Music Series each season. Most recently, Lindan played in two piano trios and a mixed ensemble with Youth Symphony colleagues Morgan Byers, Javier Mitchell Vargas, Michael Dugan, Paul Schaafsma, Camille Schaafsma, Chris Bock, Anthony Bock and siblings, Alex and Julie Burns. Lindan also plays in the Rogue Valley Symphony (RVS) and the RVS Chamber Players.

In 2015, Lindan placed 3rd in the State Solo Competition. Also in 2015, she placed 2nd in the Junior Division of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA) National Solo Competition. In 2016 she studied with Helen Callus through the Colburn School of Music's pre-college program. She has participated in Suzuki Camps, the Foulger International Music Festival, the Young Artist's Program in Ottawa, the Castleman Quartet Program and the Perlman Music Program. Lindan has participated in masterclasses and worked with Samuel Rhodes, Lawrence Dutton, Brett Deubner and Steven Tenebom. Lindan began playing violin at age 21/2. Her teacher was Linda Reams. Though she enjoys playing violin in orchestra, her primary instrument is viola. Lindan's viola and bow were loaned to her by the Maestro Foundation.

Lindan wishes to express her appreciation to her violin and viola teachers and chamber music coaches in the Rogue Valley and Portland, including Kendra Law, Susan Brown, Scott Cole, Kimberly Fitch (viola), Brian Quincey (viola), Clarisse Atcherson, Tom and Cynthia Stauffer and Bill Norfleet for their guidance and encouragement.

At present, Lindan attends Rogue Community College. She plans to continue her studies with Helen Callus in Evanston, Illinois. Lindan wishes to attend a university in order to pursue a broader education prior to earning a degree at a conservatory.

2017 Concerto Competition

The Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon's annual Concerto Competition was held on Monday evening, January 23, 2017, at the Oregon Center for the Arts Music Recital Hall at Southern Oregon University in Ashland. Advanced-level Youth Symphony musicians competed for an opportu-



nity to play with the Youth Symphony as a soloist

Participants this year included Courtney Badura (North Medford High School), Trevor Haugen (Rogue Valley Adventist Academy), Nathaniel Savage (St. Mary's School), Alex Burns (Homeschool/Reach Charter School), Aubrey Huggins (Logos Charter School), Rosie Dean (Ashland High School), Lindan Burns (Homeschool/Rogue Community College), Morgan Byers (Homeschool) and Javier Mitchell Vargas (Ashland High School). The musicians performed works by Bruch, Mozart, Shostakovich, Kabalevsky, Saint-Saëns, Wieniawski, Haydn and Albinoni.

Lindan Burns, violin, and Courtney Badura, flute, were selected as winners this year. Lindan is the featured soloist with the Youth Symphony in May 2017 and Courtney will be a featured soloist during the 2017-2018 Concert Season.

The judges for the 2017 Concerto Competition were Lori Calhoun and Mahjinka Stebbins.

SENIOR PROFILES By Patty Klein



JOHN ALMAGUER Symphony, Violin

An Ashland High School (AHS) senior and principal second violin of the Youth Symphony, John has participated in the YSSO for six years. He shared that he was inexplicably attracted to the violin during a YSSO recruiting visit to his fifth grade class. He signed up to join the Youth Orchestra shortly thereafter. In addition to his involvement with the YSSO, he plays in the AHS Chamber Orchestra and Siskiyou Violins. His private teacher is Faina Podolnaya and his school music teacher is Lauren Trolley.

John shared that he found it exhilarating to overcome the challenges posed by a work that at first glance appeared insurmountable. He enjoyed playing Georges Enesco's *Romanian Rhapsody No. 1 in A Major* and Antonin Dvorak's *Symphony No. 8 in G Major*, *Op. 88*. His advice to future YSSO musicians is that if you don't practice you are missing a wonderful opportunity to accelerate your growth as a musician. John extends his gratitude to his parents, John Almaguer and Alma Rosa Alvarez, for supporting him through the years, driving him to rehearsals and for attending his performances. John will pursue a degree in economics or English literature at college.

GEO BETUS Symphony, Trombone

Geo is principal trombone of the Youth Symphony. He is a senior at Phoenix High School and the son of George and Mary Betus. In addition to the YSSO, Geo plays in the Phoenix High School Symphonic Band and Jazz Band. Mike DeRoest is his school music teacher.






AMELIA LETHLEAN Symphony, Violin
